I have always been fascinated with collective stories, fables, and even, as may be obvious, nursery rhymes. I love stories that have been passed down from one generation to the next. Some we pass down because they are morality tales. Some are just clever or funny. Some are simply a way to encourage your children to behave.

What I wanted is to take an idea we are all familiar with — a nursery rhyme — and create a stylized story with its own unique meaning. That's what I'm doing here. The original rhyme had men as the main characters but in a time where we are asking where women fit in to the world as a whole, it felt more interesting to me to make them women.


And then I ran with their story.

Like any good collective story, this is a morality tale. It is the story of three sisters who pride themselves on their loyalty to family but allow themselves to be lead astray.

I'm a genre filmmaker who makes films about female relationships and this project is no different. I am curious about the ways in which women relate to each other when times get tough and it would be easier to throw each other under the bus. Add the possibility of magic and horror and things get all the more complicated.

The Butcher, the Baker, the Candlestick Maker is my way of looking at female relationships through a playful yet familiar lens. It's the imagination of a Disney film meets the darkness of a horror film. It is a world in which poor decisions come at a price.
